



Grants Awarded Broken down by Fund














Breakdown by Council Area



Vital Thinking:

- There were very few funds awarded in this quarter. This tends to be the norm over the summer period as there are generally no panel meetings held during this time. Two out of the six applications awarded were donor directed (Mike Moloney and David Ervine Funds). The Staff and Trustees Fund also made one award. Can/should we discuss with existing donors whether there are options to make grants under priority themes from Vital Signs research? Could the Staff and Trustees fund be a way of doing this?
- No grants were awarded under education and skills however this was the second highest priority under our Vital Signs research. Was this due to the funds/programmes that were open in this period? Should we be awarding more grants and/or offering more support under this theme? Do we need to encourage and/or enable more applications under this theme? Is this a gap? Should this theme be a focus for upcoming policy initiatives?

Vital Action:

- Discuss whether there are any existing funds that could prioritise grants under the education and skills theme.
- Analyse and discuss what we will do about the education and skills theme (along with other priority areas) as part of the Vital Signs learning and evaluation process.
- Begin to think/start discussions about how we can work with donors (existing and new) and
 potential applicants, Trustees, Ambassadors and other organisations on priorities themes raised in
 Vital Signs research. Part of this has already begun in terms of meetings and visits with groups,
 grantees, potential donors, and with strategic organisations.
 - Engage with Sam Beckett and those working in education sector initial meeting to discuss to be arranged.
- Be aware that whilst there might appear to be low numbers of grants under one theme, it is likely
 that there is indirect impact or effect through another theme, e.g. Grants relating to sport might be
 categorised under Arts & Culture but could also be classed as Health & Wellbeing
